Snowflake Table Runner

Supply List:

Satin runner
Iron-on snowflakes
Buttons

Beads

Embroidery floss

Puff paint Iron Scissors

Large eye needle

Fabric Adhesive Parchment paper





This year we are trying to inspire more than dictate directions with crafts! These satin runners are a great way to start! We've collected the supplies, now you can use the tools to create your own unique piece! Gather desired materials and decide the placement on your runner. Placement can be anywhere you choose - spread out or clustered.

Tip: Take a photo of your runner once you've found a placement you like. It may help to refer back to as materials may move while you're working.

Iron-On Snowflakes: These snowflakes have been cut using a Cricut machine. If needed, remove the negative material to "weed" the image, leaving only the snowflake. You may trim the clear plastic so that it is easier to lay out. Once you've decided on a position, lay the snowflake with the plastic side up, layer a piece of parchment paper, and gently press the iron on for approximately 30 seconds. Check to see if it fully adhered by carefully peeling up the plastic. The snowflake should remain in place. If not, repeat ironing and check again.



Beads & Buttons: Adhere the beads and buttons with clear fabric glue.







Embroidery Floss: If desired, cover the edge of your runner with embroidery floss by using a blanket stitch. Create a loop of floss through your needle. Start the blanket stitch by bringing the needle out at the far left side of the edge of the fabric. Move over one stitch length and take the needle in at the point for how long you would like your stitch. It doesn't have to be all one length. Stitch back out at the top. Pull the needle through the top stitch to complete the first stitch. Use the same steps to make the second stitch. Move one stitch length away and insert the needle at desired length and out at the top edge. Continue stitching until you reach the right edge of the fabric. End the stitch by bringing the needle down and through the fabric next to the top of the last stitch.



Puff Paint: We will be adding the puff paint last since we don't want it to smear while adding the other embellishments. Use a hanger to carefully carry your runner home without having to lay it down.
