




Voting Rights - Topical Tuesdays Tuesday, September 13 at 7 pm




Reel Art Movie *- Indian Horse* (Canadian) Friday, September 16, 7 pm

While this claim was likely marketing fiction created to evoke images of the far east, the curry powder on sale was likely a combination of Indian spices made by West and Wyatt.



Puzzle of the First Supermassive Black Holes Wednesday, September 28 at 7 pm

Way Library welcomes Dr. Eli Visbal, assistant professor in the Department of Physics and Astronomy at the University of Toledo, on Wednesday, September 28 at 7 pm for a presentation on the puzzle of the first supermassive black holes. Observations indicate that supermassive black holes with masses a



billion times greater than the sun existed shortly after the Big Bang. How these black holes formed so early is an open question. Dr. Visbal will describe our current understanding of supermassive black holes, why their early formation presents a puzzle, and several possible solutions. He will also discuss how the recently launched James Webb Space Telescope will be used to help solve this mystery.

Dr. Eli Visbal received a B.S. in physics from Carnegie Mellon University and a PhD in physics from Harvard University. Before arriving at UT, he was a postdoctoral fellow at Columbia University and the Flatiron Institute in New

York City. Dr. Visbal is a theoretical astrophysicist who uses simulations (typically performed on supercomputers) to understand the formation of the first stars and supermassive black holes in the early Universe. He is originally from Yellow Springs, Ohio.
