Happening at Way

Marking Anniversaries: A 9/11 Story

Anniversaries serve an important function in our lives. They prompt us to look back and reflect on significant events, preserving the memory of them over time.

Many such events are happy and bring joy when they are revisited. September 11 is not that kind of



Those of us who are old enough will never forget where we were when the planes hit the towers. Vivid details are etched into our memories--vivid, gut-wrenching details. We suspected that nothing would ever be the same again, and we were right.

By coincidence, 9/11 is an anniversary for Way Library, too. Our last major remodel was completed two decades ago. This is a story about the juxtaposition of the terror attacks on our homeland and Way Library's grand reopening on Tuesday, September 11, 2001. Nancy Kelley, Way's director at the time, remembers it

this way.

At 8:46am, Way Library was buzzing with excitement. It was a gorgeous, clear day. Outside, an eager crowd waited for the doors to open. Anticipation was sky-high because patrons would be getting their first look at the new space after a year-long remodel and expansion.

At the same moment, a jet plane crashed into the north tower of the World Trade Center.

Staff members were a little anxious, to tell the truth. Not only were they navigating a whole new facility footprint, but there was a brand new, unfamiliar computer system and a bewildering new phone system, too. Nothing was where it had been in the old library. Finding books was going to be a challenge for a while.

Four large flat screen televisions were mounted over handsome fireplaces as part of the remodel. Ms. Kelley remembers that there was some controversy over whether televisions deserved a place in the library. What good purpose could they possibly serve?

Last minute preparations were completed, information and circulation desk staff members took their places, televisions were switched on, and the doors were unlocked at 9am sharp.

Word was just beginning to get out that something was terribly wrong in the skies over Manhattan.

As patrons entered the library and made their way through the sparkling new main level, small clusters of curious viewers gathered in front of the televisions. Soon, curiosity would turn to shock.

At 9:03am, United Airlines Flight 175 crashed into the south tower.

Crowds formed in front of the televisions.

People continued to pour into the library. They were now drawn not just by the new space, but by the desire to come together and be with each other as the world was changing before their eyes. They found comfort in talking about what they were seeing and hearing. It was, according to Ms. Kelley, a perfect example of how the library is a place of community--a place for people to gather together to get and share information.

Staff members who had been anxious before opening felt their stress compounded as the day wore on. The beautiful tile floors in the entrance amplified every sound. Phones rang continuously. Somehow, training on how to transfer calls had been insufficient, and frustration mounted as calls were dropped and callers inconvenienced. The library had an elevator for the first time, and children found its buttons and alarms irresistible.

When the day was over, Ms. Kelley recalls that she was very proud of the staff for their performance under the circumstances. The televisions, in the meantime, earned their keep. And though it was not the grand re-opening anyone had envisioned, it was a reminder of the importance of the library to the community in good times and bad.

History Nugget



How Perrysburg's Mail was Delivered in 1945 by Richard Baranowski

Lester Jones was born in Perrysburg in 1929 and grew up in our dear old village. In an oral history recorded for Way Library, he recalled working for the post office during World War II.

"During the war, there was a shortage of workers, so younger people could get a special driver's license through the post office, and I was one of those fellows. One of my jobs was to pick up the mail from the train. The train briefly would stop at the depot on Louisiana Avenue and Third Street. Sometimes passengers would get on or off, and the train's mail clerk would throw the mail bags on a ramp."

"For express mail going to Toledo, I would hang a bag on the mail post which was just east of Elm Street on the south side of the track. The 5pm passenger train going through did not stop, and they flew. There was a hook apparatus that extended from the baggage car and it would grab the mail bag off the post. It didn't work every time though. One time the bag flipped over and the train ran over it. I walked halfway to Rossford recovering letters," he said laughing.

And that's how mail was received and delivered in Perrysburg in 1945.

The Emergency Broadband Benefit Program is a Federal Communications Commission (FCC) program that provides a temporary discount on monthly broadband bills for qualifying lowincome households. If you or someone you

know cannot afford high-speed internet access, you may qualify for a federal Emergency Broadband Benefit of up to \$50 per month.
