'Mayhem' raises funds for Way Endowment

The Way Public Library Foundation's interactive murder mystery on February 26, "Mayhem at the Manor," raised more than \$23,000 for the Way Endowment Fund—nearly twice the amount raised in last year's inaugural event.

Foundation administrator Lisa Richard chaired the event, assisted by Joan Foster, Virginia Keller, Janel Molyneux and Lea Skotynsky. Mrs.

Skotynsky, co-chair Kim Henderson and their 11-member decorating committee magically transformed the library into the manor house of murder victim Iman Ilbredde. Guests enjoyed the elegant décor and the fabulous food while they attempted to solve the mystery. The cast was magnificent. Music by The Wrecking Crew followed the unveiling of the murderer.

Legion display continues at library

The collection of veterans' photos in Way's center aisle continues to grow, thanks to the efforts of Way local history librarian Richard Baranowski and American Legion Post 28 historian Leo Darmofal.

The local Legion post's photos archives were not formally archived until Mr. Baranowski and Mr. Darmofal began the project. They started with 250 photos, some of which were unidentified; after an article on the project appeared in the Messenger Journal, at least 50 photos were added to the collection. A postersize photo collage of more than 100 World War I veterans, created by charter Legion member Gus Schlect in 1932, with portraits

numbered and named, is a unique, visually pleasing and interesting piece of local history.

While the collection has been loaned to the library by the Legion, the library has digitally copied these items for its local history archives. A booklet with biographical sketches will be kept in the Local History Room as well as given to the Legion.

Way Library and Historic Perrysburg remembered the tragic wreck of the Edmund Fitzgerald on Wednesday, March 23. See next month's newsletter for more information on the observance.

This is the 30th anniversary of the disaster. One of the crew members who perished was Eugene William O'Brien of Perrysburg Township. Among the former crew members of the Edmund Fitzgerald who participated in the Oral History tape created for this special

event at the library were Tom Walton, Allen Sharrer, Mike Capser, Richard Orgel and Mark Lathrop. Also contributing were A.L. Bentley, Jr., and John Randolph. Other former crew members and historical groups contributed to the display of memorabilia filling the library show cases that week.
