

Way Library 2005 Annual Report

Way Library had another busy year in 2005. Although total circulation (516,256: 19.1 per cardholder) was slightly down compared to 2004 (due largely to the new one-week circulation time for videos and DVDs), the library remains the busiest library in our 65+-library SEO network.

Interlibrary loans grew substantially once again: 104,130 items were either sent to or received from other libraries in the SEO consortium, up from 92,581 in 2004. Way was visited by 346,424 people in 2005 (compared to 330,200 in 2004). Our website received 144,629 visits for the year (an average of 13,148 each month).

Programming continues to grow at Way. A total of 423 programs were attended by 9,234 people, up from 8,442 in 2004. Of these programs, 298 were for children or young adults, attracting 6,772 young people to the library.

Mystery Play raises more than \$32,000 for programming, Endowment

The Way Public Library Foundation's third annual interactive murder mystery, "Felons, Flappers and Foul Play," was well received by a sellout crowd on Saturday, February 25, raising more than \$32,000 for the library's programs and the Endowment Fund.

More than 440 guests attended the event in the library—magically transformed into a 1920 Chicago speakeasy. Five of the guests solved the mystery: Harry Lumbar, played by Mark Perry, committed the murder in the band storage room with poison on the clarinet.

















Cast, crew and hundreds of volunteers contributed to the third annual interactive mystery play.

The cast of suspects included Mr. Perry, Molly Mack as Dottie Dimples, Mike Olmstead as Senator Vito D. Beale, Kim Kenderson as Cass Pajamas, Bill Irwin as Numbers Nickowski, Cindy Taylor as Jazzie Ann Swanky, Jeff Turner as Tony Rigitoni, Myra McClure as Sissy X. Capades. Wrapping up all the loose ends again this year was Bruce Brechin in his role as Detective Allan Pinkerton.
