Bob Boyd on Perrysburg's architectural heritage April 8 at Way

Historic Perrysburg, Inc., commissions an individual each year to contribute to original research into Perrysburg's history, particularly its architectural past. This year the historic group will team up with Way Library to present C. Robert "Bob" Boyd as its commissioned lecturer. On Tuesday, April 8, at 7 p.m., Mr. Boyd will speak on "Perrysburg Architecture: 10 Distinct Styles," a summary of his more than 20-year career as the historian of Perrysburg's historic homes. Informally, this talk might be called "Bob's Top Ten." Many visual images are included. This lecture is free and open to the public, and refreshments will be served.

A Perrysburg resident for 54 years, Mr. Boyd came here from Iowa. A native of Missouri and a journalism graduate of the University of Missouri, he is retired from NFO Research, where he handled public relations/sales promotion.

"Perrysburg Historic Architecture," Mr. Boyd's photographic tour of Perrysburg's historic homes, is part of Arcadia Publishing's Images of America Series. Former president of Historic Perrysburg, Mr. Boyd also has archived Perrysburg news as a volunteer at Way Public Library.

- Richard Orgel, author of the recently released book "The Edmund Fitzgerald Hull Failure," has included in his book the transcript of his 2005 interview with Way local history librarian Richard Baranowski. This oral history was taped during the 30th anniversary commemoration of the Edmund Fitzgerald sinking, an event co-sponsored by the library and Historic Perrysburg. Capt. Orgel, who previously sailed on the Fitzgerald, and others with ties to the freighter participated in the taping. Mr. Orgel's new book has been added to our collection. Topical Tuesdays, Way Library's hotbutton idea series, will move into election year mode in April and May, with two topics that may help local residents sort out candidates and understand election dynamics a little better.

On Tuesday, April 15, at 7 p.m., we

will discuss "Ohio and NAFTA:

Symbolic Politics, Benefits and Problems." Guest presenter Christine Drennen, interim Director of Canadian Studies at Bowling Green State University, will address the issue of how NAFTA influences Ohio and its work force.

Ms. Drennen will be joined by her BGSU colleague Dr. Candace Archer. Assistant professor of political science at the university, Dr. Archer will talk about this issue in broader international trade terms and then analyze how the subject surfaced during the Democratic Primary. Will NAFTA re-appear as a significant issue in the general
