## **WAY RECEIVES 5-STAR RANKING IN NEW LJ INDEX**

Ye are proud to share the good Note: Way Library has been given the highest ranking, a 5, in the new Library Journal Index of Public Library Service. The 2009 edition of the LJ Index, based upon 2006 public library statistical data from the Institute of Museum and Library Services, was released Feb. 15.

Way Library is the only library in Wood County or northwest Ohio to receive a 5-star rating based on four percapita service indicators: library visits, circulation, program attendance and public Internet computer uses.

With annual operating expenditures of \$1.6 million, Way was one of only 10 libraries across the country in its \$1 to 5 million annual expenditure category to receive the "5" rating.

Instituted by Library Journal and sponsored by Baker and Taylor's Bibliostat Connect web-based statistical analysis software for public libraries,

the new Index organizes its data into star tiers much like Michelin guides.



Of 7,115 public libraries in the country which were rated in the Index, only 256 earned a 3,4 or 5-star ranking.

Way Director Nancy Kelley pointed to the excellent results that Ohio libraries posted in the Index. Fifteen Ohio library systems received a "5" - more than any other state. Ohio libraries have suffered state funding cuts in recent years, but they have turned to operating levies and other sources of income to compensate.

Mrs. Kelley said she is grateful that Perrysburg residents recognize the value of our library as an information center and gathering place. She listed the following factors that contributed to Way's placement: "Community support, friendly staff members, state financial support, the Friends of Way Library, Library Foundation, and excellent trustees who know their role and work well with the staff."

#### Topical Tuesday Apr. 21: Preservationist/author Bill Speck on the Great Estates

Historic Perrysburg, Inc., will partner with Way Library in presenting its 2009 Commissioned Lecture. On April 21 at 7 p.m. at the library, preservationist William Speck will speak on "Perrysburg Great Estates: Surviving in Ever-Dwindling Numbers."

This lecture will be part of the library's Topical Tuesday Series due to its timeliness: Perrysburg's handsome historical properties are threatened; some recently have met with the wrecker's ball. What can we do to protect these endangered examples of our history and culture?





Focusing on the Ford, McKelvey and Frank Stranahan estates and sharing many interior and exterior images, Mr. Speck will describe the features of these homes which are unique and architecturally significant.

Mr. Speck, a resident of New York City who is involved in restoration work, is the author of the threevolume "Toledo History and Architecture." He grew up in Maumee and has a graduate degree in historic preservation from Columbia.


