Clint Mauk to tell 'Historical Tales of Toledo' here on December 5

Way Library is pleased to present Perrysburg resident Clinton Mauk as he shares excerpts from his new book "Historical Tales of Toledo," at a special event on Sunday afternoon, December 5, on the main floor of the library. At 3 p.m. Mr. Mauk will begin his chronological slide show tour of Toledo's rich history. Refreshments will be served, and after speaking Mr. Mauk will sign copies of his book.

"Historical Tales of Toledo" is a handsome, coffee-table hard cover with 30 short sketches of famous Toledoans, landmark buildings, events, and memorabilia. Designed to help area residents gain an appreciation of their ancestors, founding fathers and the rich history of Toledo, the book is a compilation of a series of presentations Mr. Mauk made to the Toledo Rotary Club in 2003-04. All proceeds from the sales of the book benefit the Rotary Club of Toledo Foundation.



Born in Toledo, Mr. Mauk has lived in Perrysburg for the past 55 years. From high school, he enlisted in the U.S. Navy and after World War II graduated from Dartmouth College. Employed in a family lumber business and then the banking business, Mr. Mauk joined the Toledo Rotary Club, serving as president in 1981-82. At that time, he began delivering short talks on Toledo history. Twenty-two years later, he resumed these "tales of Toledo," culminating in this book edited by Thomas Walton of The Blade.

Mr. Mauk helped to found the Black Swamp Conservancy and St. Timothy's Episcopal Church, led school levy campaigns and has raised funds for the Toledo Symphony and the United Way.
