## LEVY COMMITTEE HOLDS KICKOFF PARTY

The Support Your Library Campaign held a festive kickoff party on Friday afternoon, January 16, at Schaller Memorial.

The committee is launching its effort to pass Way Library's first-ever operating levy. The 1-mill, four-year levy on the March 2 ballot seeks to raise about \$475,000 – the amount of state library funding which has been cut back during the past several years.

The new tax would cost the owner of a \$200,000 home about \$62 annually, or 17 cents per day.

"We remain very grateful to voters who approved (in 1999) a bond levy to renovate and expand the library," said Nancy Kelley, Way Library director, at the event. "Additional funds raised by the Way Library Foundation allowed us to add many handsome features which make the library a community showcase."

Way Library has not increased its staff numbers, despite its doubled size. In fact, Mrs. Kelley observed at the kickoff party, the library would have had to ask voters for operating funds even if the new, expanded library had not been built.

"No one anticipated the extent of cutbacks libraries would face during this economic downturn," she said.

increase print and CD/DVD budgets.

- Increase after school children's programming, drop-in storytimes and adult programming.
- Add free computer classes.
- Restore free use of library meeting rooms for non-profit groups.

Public libraries can save you money - big time!

"Give Your Budget a Money Makeover," an article in the December 2003 Better Homes Homes & Gardens, singles out libraries as one of four major methods of cost savings for families.

"Of course, libraries are a great source of books, magazines, and newspapers that you don't have to buy yourself," the article states.

Citing expenses for a weekly movie rental (\$4 each), a CD per month (\$16), and four books on tape (\$30 each), the author estimates families can save at least \$520 per year.

Add in subscriptions and new books worth \$155, and you're up to \$675 annual savings, the author notes.

### **AARP** Tax Help now setting appointments

The AARP tax consulting service for low and middle income taxpayers is again up and running at the library.

Appointments must be made in advance by calling the Information Desk at 874-3135. x119.

After making an appointment, each taxpayer needs to verify his or her social security number by bringing a social security card, last year's federal income tax form, or a social securitv benefit letter.

Last year's tax forms are also helpful, according to Walter Hales, who coordinates the free service.

Way Library is one of more than 20 sites for the program—and has been for 30 years.

The volunteers will be available for 9:15, 10:15 and 11:15 a.m. appointments on Wednesday and Thursday, and occasionally on Tuesday and Friday mornings, said Mr. Hales.

#### Legion designates Way for historical books


Included are "The Official Roster of Ohio Soldiers and Marines, World War I," a 23-volume set, and "The Official Roster of the Soldiers of the State of Ohio in the War of the Rebellion," a 12-volume set, as well as a volume containing military records of Ohio residents who fought in the 1846-1848 Mexican-American Conflict.

Legionnaires presented the books to Richard Baranowski, librarian. The sets will be located in the Local History Room for in-house use only.

## **Country Garden Club continues assistance to library**

Perrysburg's Country Garden Club continued planting support for Way Library with an annual contribution, part of a \$75,000 commitment to the library.

On Tuesday, January 20, CGC President Jan Landwehr presented a \$15,000 check to Way Library Director Nancy Kelley for landscaping on the library grounds.

When the library completed its expansion and renovation thanks to a bond levy approved by voters in 1999, the local garden club stepped forward to provide some of the "extras" not within the construction project budget. The club has given \$60,000 to date, with the last installment of the pledge due in March 2005. Mrs. Kelley thanked Mrs. Landwehr for the CGC's generous donations. She noted that the library staff frequently hears praise for the landscaping around the parking lot, made possible by the club's support.

Within its walls, the new library has special features such as fireplaces and flat-screen TVs, thanks to private donations to the Way Public Library Foundation.

Outside the facility, the Country Garden Club has landscaped the grounds and provided furniture for the patio.
