## WAY LIBRARY TO MARK 125TH ANNIVERSARY

Way Public Library will mark an important milestone this year — the 125th anniversary of its founding.

Step back in time to 1881: Local attorney Willard Way has just left \$15,000 to the village of Perrysburg with instructions that the funds be used for a public library. Miss Harriet Hurlburt uses interest from the donation to set up a 1,000-volume borrowing library in her home at 118 Louisiana Avenue.

Everyone is invited to step back in time to attend the old-fashioned birthday celebration we have planned for Friday, April 21, from 7 to 9 p.m.

Future editions of this newsletter will include news of this community party. Through this event we hope to show our appreciation to everyone for making the library such an important part of the community for 125 years!

## 'Felons, Flappers and Foul Play' to be staged Feb. 25

## 'Study Abroad 101' on Feb. 12

Way Library will hold "Study Abroad 101" on Sunday, February 12, at 3 p.m. This panel discussion is directed toward high school students who are thinking of studying abroad in college.

Along with providing tips/practical advice, the discussion will focus on these philosophical issues: the importance of breaking down stereotypes and viewing the world from other perspectives; security concerns; the development of skills which will assist students in their future careers. Panelists will include Cynthia Whipple, director of BGSU study abroad programs; Celeste Robertson, former Peace Corps volunteer and assistant director of the BGSU Career Center; Travis Chapman, Fulbright scholar who took construction management students to Kenya, and Sarah Bradley, BGSU student who has studied in Spain and France.

## Way Library Foundation looks at results of community survey

During its Annual Campaign, the Way Public Library Foundation asked for opinions on library programs. Nearly 150 people responded to the survey.

Of the 16 categories of "types of programs of greatest interest" to the respondents, the top four choices were Author Visits (54 votes), Travel (48), History (43), and Book Discussion (41), followed by Genealogy (34), Crafts (33) and Music Recitals/Concerts (32).

In response to the question, "Which age group would you like to see the library staff focus on for upcoming

programs?" respondents chose Adults 35-55 years old and Seniors 55-plus in equal measure (46 votes each); "Family," 45 votes, and "high school," 29.

The majority of respondents favored programs held in the Evening (63 votes), and the vast majority (91) preferred programs which take place during the week rather than on weekends (35).

## Reel Art/Talk

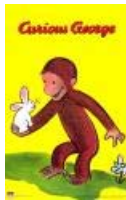
Catch a movie at Way this month:

Free classes are available in "How to Use a Mouse." Introductory classes in XP, the Internet and Email are \$20 each. Classes in how to use scanners or burn CDs are \$20 per session. Microsoft Office classes are taught in two sessions; the fee for each class is \$30. The subjects include introductory and intermediate Microsoft Word and Excel and beginning Publisher and PowerPoint. All fees include manuals and must be paid for at the Information Desk upon registration.
