Look Who's Cooking

Richard Baranowski, Local History Librarian, has submitted this month's recipe for "Look Who's Cooking." This family recipe has been handed down at least five generations. It most likely was brought over by the John Bayer family from Baden-Wurttemberg, Germany, when they came to Perrysburg in 1853, although the women of the family



probably had it committed to memory!

German Potato Dumplings

10 Potatoes

7 or 8 slices of bread

- 2 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 1 1/2 tablespoon salt
- 1. Place bread in a frying pan and brown it with grease.
- 2. Leave the fried bread out overnight.
- 3. Break up the bread in pieces the next day.
- 4. Grate the potatoes using a grater, not a grinder.
- 5. Drain the water from the potatoes after grating.
- 6. Mix the potatoes, bread, and salt.
- 7. Add flour so you can combine the ingredients into a ball that holds together.
- 8. Drop the balls into boiling water and cook about 45-60 minutes.

Makes about 10-12 dumplings.
