In the past month, Ohio public libraries have been reeling in response to cuts in the Ohio Public Library Fund (PLF) of \$84.3 million over the next two years.

In June, Governor Ted Strickland proposed cuts in state library support in the 2010-2011 budget totaling \$227.3 million (50%). In July, the Ohio General Assembly restored some library support. The Ohio Department of Taxation estimates that libraries will experience a 31% decrease in funding due to PLF cuts and lowered tax revenue in 2009.

Way Library - and all libraries across the state - thank the citizens of Ohio for telephoning, emailing and personally contacting their elected representatives to influence the lawmakers' response to the Governor's initial proposal.

LIBRARY FUNDING SLASHED 31% IN STATE BUDGET

challenging times that we face. Not only do people turn more and more to the free resources and services that libraries provide, libraries have directly responded to the recession by offering job search help, homework assistance, greater computer access, and computer skill and resume workshops or classes.

Thanks to the generous support of our local taxpayers, Way Library has an operating levy which provides for 45% of our revenue each year. According to Director Nancy Kelley, this has spared us from some of the draconian cuts put into place by libraries that rely solely on state funding. "But we have reduced the materials budget by nearly 23 percent. We have made changes in weekend scheduling and mileage reimbursement and are stepping up our efforts to build the library's endowment fund as well as the number of memorial book donations from our loyal patrons," she said.

Due to budget cutbacks, the library is looking at ways to cut costs. This new policy is expected to save Way Library nearly \$5,000 each year in postage, paper and printing. The staff is evaluating other environmentally friendly ways to save costs and increase efficiency.


